Overview and Timeline of the Project

Site Features

- 24/7 staffing
- Capacity for up to 38 adults / sleeping pods
- Housing Case Management + Office Spaces
- Recovery Services
- Hygiene and laundry facilities
- Kitchenette amenities
- Green space
- Fence with privacy inserts on all street sides

Do Good Multnomah's (DGM) Programming

Harrison Village will be a clean & sober model.

- Services by staff who are active in their recovery.
- Requires participants to abstain from all substances, incl. alcohol, not prescribed by a licensed medical provider.
- Background checks for pre-screening participants before move in are required & done by DGM.
- Routine and random oral swab will be required for participants and staff; with a recovery technician onsite.



Purpose and Overview of the Good Neighbor Agreement (GNA)

Purpose of the GNA

- Parties express their commitment to fostering goodwill and positive working relationships for mutual benefit
- They intend to work towards these goals:
 - Maintain open, productive, and transparent communication
 - Establish clear problem resolution expectations / procedures
 - Foster positive relationships between the Harrison Community Village and neighbors
 - Support neighborhood safety, livability, and access to services

- Do Good Multnomah (DGM)
- 82nd Ave. Business Association
- African Youth & Community Organization (AYCO)
- Asian Pacific American Network of Oregon (APANO)

- Portland Public Schools (PPS)

Agreements of All Parties

- Support neighborhood safety, livability, and quality of life
- Promptly report unsanctioned camping or suspected criminal activity
- Engage in collaborative problem solving around issues that arise, and jointly resolve problems quickly

Agreements of All Parties (continued...)

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- Encourage and facilitate neighborhood volunteer activities and other positive relationship building activities with DGM and shelter participants.
- Make the signed Agreement publicly available online

DGM Agreements

- Prohibit weapons and use best efforts to prevent the use or possession of illegal substances and alcohol at the Harrison Community Village.
- Follow noise ordinances and enforce quiet hours between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- Establish pet agreements and limits # of pets onsite.

DGM Agreements (continued...)

- Address programming concerns and complaints, promptly investigate and implement timely solutions when possible and as needed.
- Encourage community ownership among staff and participants and promote positive interactions between participants and neighbors.
- Share regular program updates with neighbors, offer resolutions on shelter issues / volunteer opportunities.

HSD Agreements


- Ensure the shelter is run in compliance with relevant federal, state and local laws, regulations and policies.
- Ensure DGM takes steps to create a safe, respectful, and secure environment for neighbors and shelter participants.
- Provide prompt and effective means to address concerns and support DGM in resolving them.

HSD Agreements (continued...)

- Any changes to the design layout should adhere to applicable jurisdictional regulations, consider impacts to neighbors and businesses, and include community engagement
- Will not open additional shelter sites inside the Good Neighbor Zone under the Community Sheltering Strategy (*see next slide*)

Engagement and Good Neighbor Zones

- **Engagement Zone:**
DGM and County will address unsanctioned campsites and shelter concerns through engagement and City service reporting (**red**).
- **Good Neighbor Zone:**
HSD commits to not opening additional shelter sites under the Community Sheltering Strategy (**blue**).




Portland Public Schools (PPS) Agreements

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- PPS will identify a liaison between PPS — its staff, families and students — and other Parties, with these goals:
 - Maintain open communication with all parties.
 - Address concerns of unneighborly behavior related to known participants of the shelter.
 - Direct questions/comments received by school staff, students and families to DGM efficiently.
 - Report issues regarding physical / structural shared or adjacent spaces to DGM promptly.

Communication Structure



Community Advisory Committee (CAC)

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- The CAC will be the primary contact for all Parties to collaborate on community projects or address concerns.
- Responsibilities include:
 - Maintaining strong communication between the HSD, the Operator, and other Parties of this Agreement.
 - Ensuring commitments in this Agreement are upheld.
 - Identifying and developing solutions for recurring issues not resolved through the existing communication strategies in the Communication Structure above.

Regional Arts & Culture Council (RACC)

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- As part of the Multnomah County Percent for Art Program, which is led by the Regional Arts & Culture Council (RACC), Harrison Community Village has dedicated funds available for public art and associated programming.
- An artist-in-residence opportunity will be made available for regional artists with lived experience. RACC's definition of an artist-in-residence is an artist that is rooted in social practice; we expect an artist to be embedded in and engaged with the community. The project typically result in participatory arts programming including workshops, events, hands-on activities, etc. as part of the final tangible artistic outcomes of the project.
- While the focus of this residency is centered around the residents of Harrison Community Village, the selected artist(s) will be encouraged to explore broader collaborations with other neighborhood partners.
- RACC advocates for equity, inclusion and access within the arts and connects artists and creatives to opportunities throughout the region. Learn more at racc.org.
